In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified to vote in Elections and Town affairs, to meet in Town Hall in said Middlefield, on Monday the tenth day of February next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator.
- Art. 2. To choose on one ballot a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, Three selectmen and Commissioners of Public Welfare, Two Constables, an Auditor, a Tree Warden for a term of one year. An Assessor, a School Committee Member, a Cemetery Commissioner and a Trustee of the Public Library for a term of three years. The polls will be open at 10:30 o'clock A.M. and may be closed at 2:30 o'clock P.M.

The business meeting will start at 2:00 o'clock P.M.

- Art. 3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Assessors, Treasurer, Commissioners of Public Welfare, School Committee and Tax Collector and act thereon.
- Art. 4. To choose such Town Officers as are not required by law to be chosen by ballot.

- Art. 5. To determine the manner of repairing the highways and bridges and pass any vote in relation to the same.
 - Art. 6. To determine the disposition of the Dog Fund. Other articles may be added to this warrant.

And you are directed to serve this warrant by posting attested copies of the same at each of the Post Offices in said Town seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at or before the time of holding said meeting.

School Committee

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of Middlefield:

I take pleasure in submitting herewith my report as Superintendent of Schools for the year ending Dec. 31, 1946.

Personnel

Mr. LeGrand Thompson resigned his position at the end of the school year in June. Mrs. Helen Jaques of Chester, a graduate of Lyndon Normal School, Vermont, was engaged as teacher of the Center School.

We have been without the services of a school nurse for the entire year following The resignation of Mrs. Elizabeth Furlong last December. The problem of securing nursing services is discussed further in this report.

As noted in my report a year ago, the most serious problem facing public education today is the one of securing qualified personnel. The solution continues to be increased salaries that will attract worthy young people into the profession and adequate state and federal aid to make possible the payment of necessary salaries. This problem will also be discussed later in this report.

Attendance

The percentage of attendance for the past school year ending in June was 94.84. This record is 3.45 higher than for the last school year.

Repairs

It is very disappointing not to have the new heating plants installed. I suggest that the contractor be required to make these installations within a reasonable time or the job be given to a new contractor.

Curriculum

For several years during the war period organized physical education work had to be omitted for lack of a supervisor. A trained supervisor is now available and several school committees of neighboring communities have expressed a desire to cooperate in the establishment of a district physical education supervisor in order that they may have organized physical education work in their schools. This work is an important part of the school health program and I hope it will be possible to offer this work in the Middlefield schools again in September. The proposed budget includes an amount to cover the cost of this work to begin in September.

A nature study course under the auspices of the Massachusetts Audubon Society and the Berkshire Museum is being offered this year. Although the cost of the course has increased from \$60.00 to \$75.00 it is very much worthwhile and I hope it can be continued. It was first planned to offer it alternately in the two schools. I believe now that a better plan would be to have the course given in the Center School each year and make plans to transport the Bancroft pupils to the Center for this course.

Achievement

The scores in the standard achievement tests given in the elementary grades in June were not as high as we have consistently maintained. I can only attribute this to the fact that a very large number of pupils were absent during the last three or four weeks preceding the tests and in some instances the scores may not represent a true average class achievement because many pupils were not present to take the tests. The median score results compared with standard medians are given below.

The results of the Iowa Tests of Educational Development given in the Chester High School in November are very satisfactory. The composite test norms of Chester High School exceed both the New England States' norms and the National norms. The following table gives the comparative norms.

ART

The art work continues in the same manner as that of other years. Large group posters were made for exhibition at the Fair. One beautiful poster was made on India by the children at Bancroft. It showed a beautiful marble and gold castle in the background with a row of cone shaped trees beside a walk leading to the castle. There was a big elephant carrying an elaborate seat on his back in which were two chiefs dressed in gorgeous clothes. The common people were watching the procession. Another poster showed the Bancroft children dancing around a May Pole. In the background was their school. Interior decoration was another project successfully carried out. Their freehand drawing and seasonal posters were well made.

At Middlefield Center a large group poster was made on a western cowboy town. Interior decoration, printing, perspective, figure drawing, and designs in central balance have been well carried out. Under Mrs. Jaques' supervision chip carving has been carried out by the older children.

MUSIC

I have endeavored first of all to instill into the minds of all the pupils a love of good music. This is being accomplished in the following manner.

Primary grades: Rote singing, correction of monotones, recreational singing, some theory and music reading, and a little appreciation.

Intermediate grades: Varied processes have been used to establish good sight reading, chromatic signs and sounds introduced. Two and three part singing developed. Recreational singing, music memory, and appreciation.

Grades 7 and 8: Reviewed all theory learned through grades 1-6. Placement of sharps and flats and bass clef introduced and developed. Style and expression stressed. Recreational singing, music memory, and appreciation.

SCHOOL HEALTH SERVICES

During the past few years our school health services have been interrupted and curtailed through the inability to secure a school nurse. During the past year we have had no nursing services.

The schools' health program is of primary importance. The State prescribes by statute that each town must employ a school nurse. Something should be done whereby our school nursing service is made constant and a development of the program made possible.

I recommend that the three towns comprising the school union consider the establishment of a health district to employ a full-time district health nurse. Such a district nurse would perform the school health work, other com-

munity health services for boards of health and welfare, and private nursing services at a relatively small cost. The cost of operating a health district would be met in part from school, health, and welfare department funds and in part from fees collected from insurance companies and individuals for private services rendered. This health district organization would solve the school nurse problem and provide nursing services for the entire community at much less cost to the individual than such services can now be secured.

HIGH SCHOOL CLASSIFICATION

New regulations for the classification of high schools as Class A or Class B schools have been proposed and are being discussed throughout the State. The regulations are set up under the three general headings of personnel, program, and school plant. I wish to point out the possible effect of these regulations on the classification of Chester High School.

- 1. Personnel: To classify as an A school it will be necessary to decrease the teaching load of the principal to a maximum of four classes a day.
- 2. Program: The new regulations prescribe definite inclusion of recent development in Guidance, Aviation, Driver Education, and Consumer Education. It may be necessary to increase or revise the offerings in these fields.
- 3. School Plant: The present school plant is probably satisfactory with the possible requirement that the lighting be improved in classrooms similar to the improvement made in the main room this year.

With the exception of these three items Chester High School, will, I believe, meet the requirements of the new proposed regulations. These improvements are by no means beyond attainment and I can see no reason why Chester

High School should not, continue in the A Class where it has always been placed.

Finances

The problem of adequately financing the public education program is facing every community as well as the state and the national governments. The fact that greatly increased support is immediately needed to avert the collapse of the public school system is universally recognized. This increased support must very largely come through increased state and federal aid. Especially is this true in the case of small communities the majority of which now have tax rates which place a heavy burden on real estate. That increased state and federal aid will soon become a reality is quite certain. However, to make sure that this aid will be made adequate by the enactment of the proper legislation, we must give our wholehearted support to educational leaders legislators who propose worthy legislation. Furthermore we should request that our own representatives and congressmen sincerely support such legislation.

I would suggest that school committees, and other official town boards, selectmen, assessors, finance board and all who are interested in maintaining good schools at a minimum cost to the community pass resolutions and forward same to our legislative representatives urging them to support adequate school aid legislation.

Although our teachers have been given liberal salary increases during the past few years the average salary is below that of most other communities in this section of the state. Our present salaries are not sufficient to secure teachers in the competitive market.

Other educational costs have likewise increased. Textbooks and supplies have increased within the past few years 40 to 60 percent. Transportation costs have also increased.

The following budget is submitted for your study and consideration. The financial needs for the year 1947 are estimated at \$11,850.00. This amount is approximately \$900.00 more than this year's expenditures. A major part of the increase is accounted for in the salary items. Other expenditures are being kept as low as possible.

The following table presents a comparison of proposed expenditures with actual expenditures during the last four years. It also shows the estimated receipts, based on present school aid laws, and net cost from local taxes for 1947 compared to the receipts and net cost for the last four years.

Report of Audit

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Middlefield for the period from November 14, 1944 to June 30, 1946, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Middlefield for the period from November 14, 1944, the date of the previous audit, to June 30, 1946, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as entered on the records

of the several departments receiving or disbursing town funds or sending out bills for collection, were examined and checked in detail.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The payments were checked with the warrants approved by the selectmen, the cash book was footed, and the cash balance on June 30, 1946 was proved by actual count of cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The tax title deeds in the custody of the treasurer were listed and checked with the accounts of the tax collector.

The securities and savings bank books representing the investment of trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer were examined and listed. The income was verified and the withdrawals were checked.

The records of payroll deductions on account of federal withholding taxes were checked. The deductions were listed, the payments to the Collector of Internal Revenue were verified, and the cash in the general treasury on June 30, 1946 was proved.

The surety bonds of the town officers required to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In checking the computation of the tax rates by the assessors for the period covered by the audit, it was noted that appropriations from available funds voted at the annual town meetings in 1945 for \$7,000, and in 1946 for \$12,000, for highway projects in conjunction with the State and County, were not used in the determination of the 1945 and 1946 tax rates respectively, due to the failure of the town clerk to certify these appropriations to the assessors.

Attention is again called to the provisions of Section 15A, Chapter 41, General Laws, which requires the town clerk to certify to the assessors, in detail, all votes appropriating money and the provision made for meeting the same, in order that the provisions of Section 23, Chapter 59, General Laws may be complied with in computing the annual tax rate.

Attention is also called to Section 64, Chapter 44, General Laws which provides the manner in which unpaid bills of a previous year may be paid.

It was noted that expenditures for the operation and maintenance of highway equipment have been made directly from the Road Machinery Fund which consists of accumulated earnings of town-owned highway equipment. It is recommended that, in the future, specific appropriations be voted by the town each year from the Road Machinery Fund for the maintenance and operation of highway equipment or for the purchase of new equipment.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined and checked. The recorded receipts were compared with the records of fees charged and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The receipts from dog and sporting licenses were checked with the record of licenses issued, and the payments to the treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified. The cash on hand on June 30, 1946 was proved by actual count.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The tax accounts outstanding according to the previous examination and all subsequent commitments were audited and reconciled with the assessor's warrants. The recorded collections were checked in detail, the payments to the treasurer were verified, the abatements were compared with the assessors' record of

abatements granted, the outstanding accounts were listed and proved, and the cash on hand on June 30, 1946 was verified by actual count.

To prove the outstanding accounts, verification notices were sent to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of accounts receivable of the public welfare department and of the bureau of old age assistance were analyzed, the collections as recorded were compared with the treasurer's record of receipts, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

It was noted that the federal grants received on account of old age assistance have been added to and merged with appropriations voted by the town for such purpose. Attention is called to Section 7, Chapter 436, Acts of 1936, which requires that money received from federal grants be kept in separate accounts and expended for the purpose specified by the State Department of Public Welfare. Payments on approved cases should be charged directly against the proper grant accounts, and any balances in these accounts at the close of the year should be carried forward.

Ledger accounts were compiled, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on June 30, 1946.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the transactions and condition of the trust and investment funds.

For the cooperation received from all town officials

while engaged in making the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.
